Tevye, a poor Jewish milkman with five unmarried daughters, lives with his sharp-tongued wife in the village of Anatevka in Czarist Russia. With growing anti-Semitism in the village, Tevye talks to God about his troubles. His people's traditions keep him strong when his existence is balanced as precariously as a fiddler on the roof.

Based on the experiences of best-selling author Pat Conroy (*The Great Santini*, *The Prince of Tides*), this touching drama unfolds during the summer of 1969. Conroy (Jeff Hephner) is full of youthful enthusiasm and idealism. And he's just what the "good ol' boy" bureaucrats of Beaumont County think they need to fill an empty teaching slot at an all African-American school on Yamacraw Island, off the coast of South Carolina.

Conroy is excited about this new challenge until he comes up against a brick wall, namely the school's principal and his only colleague, Mrs. Brown (Alfre Woodard). Brown's legacy is the fear she instills in her students—a practice which has gone unquestioned for years, until Conroy comes along with his more unconventional methods. Despite her disapproval, Conroy forges on, becoming possibly the first teacher to truly get to know the students—their likes and dislikes; their hopes and fears.

As the bond with his students deepens, Conroy receives his own education about the gap that divides all of them, including Mrs. Brown. Risking his livelihood—but never his principles—he teaches his students valuable life lessons and lays groundwork for the possibility for real change.

Irena Sendler is one of the most remarkable—and most unlikely—heroes of World War II, saving 2,500 Jewish children during the German occupation of Poland.

As a social worker, Irena (Anna Paquin) had access to the Warsaw Ghetto, making it possible for her to rescue the young daughter of a Jewish friend and safely hide the girl with a Catholic family. Realizing that thousands of children were still in danger, Irena recruited sympathetic friends and co-workers to smuggle children out and place them in safe homes, farms and convents. At great personal risk, she devised extraordinary schemes to sneak the children by Nazi guards, bringing them out in ambulances and suitcases, and even wheelbarrows.

Irena was eventually captured by the Gestapo. Even after months of torture, she maintained her silence. Her heroic efforts were honored by a nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2007.

### **Historical Society**

The program of the North Manchester Historical Society on **Monday, July 12**, will focus on the story of Roann (or history, if you wish.) It will be presented by Ellie Draper from Roann. Ms. Draper was born in Roann and has been a school teacher there for 25 years and an assistant in an Insurance Agency for 15 years.

She was very active in organizing a Sesquicentennial Committee to plan for the celebration of Roann's 150<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2003. She also created the "Roann's Community Heritage, Inc." dedicated to the preservation of the town's history, stories and architecture.

She will tell how the town was named, some of the original settlers, the man who laid out the town, and stories of the survival of Roann down through the years. More stories tell of the rivalry between Roann and Stockdale and how one survived and the other did not.
