In the 1920's when movies were silent, large theaters hired orchestras to provide descriptive sounds and music to move the plot forward and to enhance the story. When orchestras were too expensive, many theaters, like the Embassy in Fort Wayne, installed large theater pipe organs to create the mood. Still smaller theaters, like the Crystal Theater in North Manchester, used pianos.
