Dan West Exhibit at MC

A permanent display honoring Heifer Project founder Dan West will be opened in Funderburg Library at Manchester College on **Monday, May 10.** The dedication ceremony will be at **1 p.m. in Cordier Auditorium, and the unveiling and reception will follow at 2 p.m. in the library.** Joining the May 10 unveiling and dedication of the 12-foot-wide by 8-foot-tall display will be West’s daughter Jan Schrock (a 1958 Manchester graduate); Ray Bowman, a Seagoing Cowboy (merchant seamen who “escorted” animals to their overseas destinations); other College and Heifer representatives; and area school and Heifer donors and supporters.

Due to transportation provided for the IAHSA pool tournament, Timbercrest transportation will not be available for this event. Interested parties are encouraged to car-pool.

West was a 1917 graduate of Manchester College and a lifelong member of the Church of the Brethren. The idea for what has become Heifer International stemmed from West’s service to people during the Spanish Civil War, when he witnessed the challenge of trying to feed people in need with imported powdered milk.

Many artifacts of West’s service, including his Bible, notebooks, awards and even a Spanish orphan’s shoes are in the display, said President Switzer. Other items include Seagoing Cowboy memorabilia, including a photograph of Faith, the first heifer given to Heifer International.

“Dan West was a man with a mission – to help people, to end hunger and to make the world a better place for everyone,” said Jo Luck, president of Heifer International. “We are proud to carry on his work with the families and the children he loved so much around the world.”
