4) The boats will be propelled by members of your crew, but the crew members may not touch the boats at all - no strings or other devices. Fans are acceptable.

5) Boats should have a **name that reflects the people who live on your wing or street**. Individual names do not need to appear on the boat, but the crew/boat name is required.

6) You will be able to give your boat some **practice runs on Thursday, January 12**. Otherwise, your own water source will have to suffice.

7) Races will be done for time. Therefore, you may win individual races, but your cumulative time will determine your placement in the finals.

Winter Trips and Outdoor Tips

Timbercrest encourages safety first in winter travel and trips. When Timbercrest has outings and events scheduled off-campus, we try to keep passenger safety as our primary concern.

1) If you are signed up for an event and **do not feel that it is safe for you to go, do not feel obligated to go.** Let Program and Service know that you would rather not participate and it will be fine.

2) **Timbercrest will not cancel most trips until the morning of the departure.** Often dire weather predictions the day or night before do not materialize, and canceling the trip prematurely is unwise. You will be notified by telephone if you have signed up and we are not going. A general rule-of-thumb is that if the local schools are closed, we will also not be going.

3) It is always wise to **wear a coat on winter events,** even if most of the time will be spent in a vehicle. If there should be a break-down, a coat and scarf or hat will help protect you from the cold.

4) If you are going outdoors in the winter, be sure to bundle up well.

5) It is wise to **let someone know you are leaving the building, even for a short walk.** Ice and snow hazards increase the risk of falling. If someone knows you are out and you do not return soon, it will allow others to search for you more quickly.

6) It is healthy to breathe the fresh winter air; however, you may want to **wear a mask or scarf to prevent unnecessary discomfort to your throat and lungs.**
